Craig Forcese is a full professor at the Faculty of Law (Common Law Section), University of Ottawa, where he also serves as Vice Dean (Graduate Studies) (interim).

He is also an Adjunct Research Professor & Senior Fellow, Norman Paterson School of International Affairs, Carleton University and a National Security Crisis Law Fellow, Center on National Security and the Law at Georgetown Law (Washington DC).

Craig sits on the executive on the Canadian Network for Research on Terrorism, Security and Society (TSAS), and is a past president of the Canadian Council on International Law and the Canadian Association of Law Teachers.

At uOttawa, Craig teaches public international law, national security law, and administrative law. He also co-teaches advanced international law and relations at the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs. He co-organizes and instructs the Canadian component of Georgetown Law's National Security Crisis Law course and simulation.

Craig has a B.A. from McGill University, an M.A. from the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs, Carleton University, a JD (summa cum laude) from uOttawa and an LL.M. from Yale University.
